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Beacon Federation Choir Raises the Cathedral Roof

On Sunday 22nd September, pupils from the Beacon Federation were invited to sing at the Diocesan Commissioning Service at Norwich Cathedral.

Executive Headteacher Moira Croskell has provided us with a report from the Service:

"We were delighted that 40 pupils from our Key Stage 2 choir and some of our parents were able to join us at the Cathedral on Sunday evening for the special Celebration and Commissioning Service."

"We sang a song called "We Are Unstoppable" which we felt linked perfectly with the theme of Journeys for this year's

service. It was a new song for our pupils so we had to do some extra singing sessions to be ready for the day, but the children learnt it so quickly that we had time to split parts to add to the performance."



"The children loved the experience, and hearing the echo of their voices in the Cathedral encouraged them to put that extra bit of effort into their performance. Both the Bishop of Norwich and the Bishop of Thetford referred to the pupils throughout the service, which also made them feel very special. We even got to blow out the candles at the end!"

"I was extremely proud of all of the pupils and their focus and confidence singing in such a magnificent building but also in front of lots of adults they didn't know. I am hugely grateful to Mrs Delaine and Mr Sanders for the time they put in, at short notice, to ensure the pupils were performance ready. I think it was an evening that those pupils will not forget."

St Benet's CEO, Richard Cranmer, also attended the Commissioning Service and commented, "The children's singing was jaw dropping, they sounded like opera singers in the stunning surroundings of the Cathedral. I congratulate the children and Mrs Delaine and Mr Sanders for their hard work in putting on such an amazing show."

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Operational Updates from DoNESC-1

DoNESC (Diocese of Norwich Education Services Company) provide St Benet's with back office services including HR, Finance, Payroll, Governance and Estates.

Operational Changes in DoNESC

Over the past few months there have been a number of operational changes predominantly in the Finance Service at DoNESC, which involve individuals that many schools and central teams would regularly interact with.

They have recently seen the departure of David Fannon, the Financial Controller, and have also seen the departure of Scott Buxton, the Finance Processing Team leader and two finance processing team members, Rebecca Bay and Paul Harris.

DoNESC have been fortunate to appoint Kirsty Vassallo, who was previously the DNEAT Executive Team PA into the Finance Manager - Processing Team role and Kirsty is actively recruiting to the Finance Administrator vacancies in her team.

DoNESC are not immediately replacing the Financial Controller role, and the responsibilities that sat with this role will move to Stephen Beeson who will provide direct management support to the Finance Team.

Recruitment Update

We are excited to announce the development of an Applicant Tracking System to modernise and streamline the recruitment process for all academies and ensure a positive experience for candidates.

We are working with Teacher Booker and Education Job Finder and are currently in the set-up stage of the programme, with a planned release, including training, to all academies in January 2025.

Within this we will also be updating various safer recruitment documents and contacting each academy around the creation of standardised advert wording, so please keep an eye out for these comms. I will also be scheduling a webinar for School Business Managers to attend, to hear more information around the positive changes this system will bring, the planned timeline, and give a forum for any questions. This is an exciting next step for the Trust, and we look forward to sharing more details in the coming months.

Phishing - Reporting Suspicious Emails to Ergo



'Phishing' is when criminals use scam emails, text messages or phone calls to trick their victims. The aim is often to make you visit a website, which may download a virus onto your computer, or steal bank details or other personal information.

Scammers will try to gain your trust and look to pressurise you into thinking rashly and too quickly. Some examples are:

- 1. **Authority -** Is the message claiming to be from someone official? For example, your bank, doctor, a solicitor or a government department. Criminals often pretend to be important people or organisations to trick you into doing what they want. This could also be an email claiming to be someone from within your organisation, with an email address that is only slightly different from the correct one.
- 2. **Urgent -** Are you told you have a limited time to respond (such as 'within 24 hours' or 'immediately')? Criminals often threaten you with fines or other negative consequences.
- 3. **Emotion -** Does the message make you panic, fearful, hopeful or curious? Criminals often use threatening language, make false claims of support, or tease you into wanting to find out more.
- 4. **Scarcity -** Is the message offering something in short supply, like concert tickets, money or a cure for medical conditions? Fear of missing out on a good deal or opportunity can make you respond quickly.
- 5. **Current Events -** Are you expecting to see a message like this? Criminals often exploit current news stories, big events or specific times

Please always be ultra vigilant and take a moment to consider if the email looks to be suspicious.

Data Protection Daily

All personal data must be protected but remember that data related to children is always afforded a higher level of protection. As we get settled into the new school year now, here are a few quick reminders:

- 1. If you are filling out a form with a child's details <u>always start a fresh blank form</u>. I understand it can be tempting to overtype if it is something you do a lot, but it might not be worth the risk for those few extra minutes.
- 2. Autofill in emails is not always our friend <u>take the time every time</u> to double-check your recipients.
- 3. <u>Only keep what you really need</u> and only in as many places as absolutely necessary avoid creating/saving extra electronic copies if you can.
- 4. If you are working on a computer lock your screen every time you walk away.
- 5. When mistakes do happen, be open and report them either to your manager/Headteacher or straight onto the <u>online form</u>. We have developed a great culture of openness over the last year let's keep that going.

Reminder - Mandatory Training

Training on Data Protection for **anyone** in an organisation handling personal data is a requirement of the UK General Data Protection Regulation (UKGDPR). For this reason, all school staff are being asked to complete three 15-minute modules on IAM Compliant:

- 1. GDPR Overview
- 2. Data Handling (Best Practices)
- 3. Data Breaches

Central Team members, Headteachers, School Business Managers and all DoNESC colleagues have already completed this training requirement.

The deadline for completion is the end of the term (31st December). Headteachers have been asked to arrange for this training to be made accessible on IAM Compliant for their own school teams. I know that some Headteachers have already included the training in the INSET days earlier this month, for which I am grateful. I understand that everyone is busy, but it is important that the Trust can demonstrate compliance with the law. There is already wide use of IAM Compliant in the Trust, so the training should be easy to access.

From now on, these will become annual requirements, and I will send reminders and monitor compliance as the Data Protection Officer for the Trust. If you have any questions about accessing the training on IAM Compliant please don't hesitate to contact Hannah Monk at governance@donesc.org.

Open the Book

There has been some recent discussion around the checks that are made in terms of Open the Book. Further information on Open the Book can be found here:

Open the Book are classed as visitors to the school. They are not in regulated activity and must not be left alone with children and must be fully escorted whilst on site.

They will have an Enhanced DBS without Barred List carried out by the church they are linked to but you do not need to see this.

They do not need to be recorded on the SCR.

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Did you know...

St Benet's pays for all its employees to have free access to the Spectrum.Life employee wellbeing service. If you haven't registered yet, follow the simple instructions below to sign up online.

A New Director of Mission and Ministry for the Diocese of Norwich

The Revd Canon Richard Lamey has been announced as the Director of Mission and Ministry in the Diocese of Norwich. In this role, he will be supporting parishes, clergy and lay leaders in the local church, as well as encouraging discipleship and vocations.

The new post is funded from external sources including grants from the Church Commissioners and the Anne French Memorial Trust. Richard will start in September 2024 subject to the usual legalities.

The Bishop of Norwich, the Rt Revd Graham Usher said: "We are very pleased to welcome Richard to the Diocese at this exciting time. He brings a wealth of

experience of mission and ministry in a parish setting and at a diocesan level, which will give him great foundations for his work with us. I look forward to seeing all that God will do through him in this next season."

Richard said: "I am really excited to be moving to Norwich for so many different reasons, getting to know the area and the churches of the Diocese, joining a team of such commitment and vibrancy, finding out what God is already blessing and inspiring and encouraging others to join in with where God is at work."

"It is also exciting that this is a new role and I am looking forward to helping to lead those working in Mission and Ministry as we support and encourage the local church to be more Prayerful, Pastoral and Prophetic, and as we listen together to local experience, local longings and learning from the things that are already working well in parishes, chaplaincies and new congregations across the Diocese."

Richard is currently Rector of the three Churches of the Parish of St Paul in Wokingham in the Diocese of Oxford. He is also the Area Dean of Sonning, a member of Bishop's Council and Diocesan Synod, and Young Vocations Champion for the Archdeaconry of Berkshire.

Richard is married to Becca, a Secondary Maths Teacher and has three children who are 20, 19 and 18 and an elderly Border Collie called Bramble.
